E – Safety Lessons – Whole School Approach

Each year the E-Safety sessions are devised to be part of the PSHE curriculum but are taught as bespoke sessions – often during a full / half day in each class.

These sessions change each year and are dependent on the needs of the pupils at the time, together with the advices received from national e-safety organisations such as :

- UK Council for Child Internet Safety (UKCIS)
- NSPCC
- UK Safer Internet Centre
- ThinkUknow
- INEQE Safeguarding group

In addition to these focused days, each class teacher has the opportunity to teach sessions which deal with any issues that arise in school.

In the past, these have included :

- Disclosure of personal information online
- Be friending people online who you don't know / friend requests
- Use of cameras on laptops / tablets
- Social media usage
- Appropriate age related apps / gaming sites
- Online gaming
- Reporting issues that concern the children

For Year 2019 – 2020 the set days for sessions are :

Thurs 7th Nov - Cyberbullying

Tues 11th Feb - Internet Safety Day

Wed 22nd April - Video/Webcam

Wed 3rd Jun – Apps

Resources for the sessions are provided by the Computing Co-ordinator and are stored on the school drive.

Tell an adult if someone or something makes you feel worried or uncomfortable.

 Be as kind to people online as you would be to them in the playground.

 Check the age restrictions of games, apps and websites. You might not be old enough!

 Only post photos or videos of people if you have asked their permission first.

 Keep personal information private; this includes your last name, passwords, photos and school name.



 Don't meet up. Meeting someone you have only spoken to online can be dangerous. Always check with an adult you trust.

 Tell someone if you feel worried or uncomfortable about something.
